

Masterclass on Architecture and Utopia, offered by Dr Nathaniel Coleman, Thursday 7 July 2011, in Nicosia, one day prior to the start of the 12th International Conference of the European Utopian Studies Society



Interested postgrads and younger scholars, including PhD candidates, are invited to submit expressions of interest in participating in a **Masterclass on Utopia and Architecture** offered by Nathaniel Coleman in conjunction with the publication of his new Ralahine edition: *Imagining and Making the World: Reconsidering Architecture and Utopia*, Volume 8 of the Ralahine Center for Utopian Studies book Series. The Class will be held on **Thursday 7 July 2011**, one day prior to the official start of the upcoming 12th International Conference of the **European Utopian Studies Society in Nicosia, Cyprus**. The Class will be two hours in duration, follow a seminar format, and participation is limited to first 15 people signing up for it. There will also be time after the Class for informal and one-to-one conversations. Although there are no prerequisites for joining the Class, candidates are asked to include in their expressions of interest in participating an explication of how the proposed Masterclass fits into their current research projects. A current CV is also requested. This is not so much for selection purposes but rather is intended as a means for pre-focusing the Class around the specific interests of participants. The Class will consider the historicity of the ongoing problematic of architecture and Utopia, with the aim of opening up new areas of inquiry into the topic.

During the Class we will consider possible research models for achieving this by raising questions and opening up debates around the topic. More specifically, participants in the Class will be asked to focus on the introduction to *Imagining and Making the World: Reconsidering Architecture and Utopia*, and on the **Triologue**. In addition, participants are invited to respond to one of the other essays in the collection. In order to facilitate the Class, participants would be expected to buy the book, in advance of the conference, at the conference discount of 30% off the cover price. Book synopsis: Although the association between architecture and utopia (the relationship between imagining a new world and exploring how its new conditions can best be organized) might appear obvious from within the domain of utopian studies, architects have long attempted to dissociate themselves from Utopia. Concentrating on the difficulties writers from both perspectives have with the topic, this collection interrogates the meta-theoretical problematic for ongoing intellectual work on architecture and Utopia. The essays explore divergent manifestations of the play of Utopia on architectural imagination, situated within specific historical moments, from the early Renaissance to the present day. Enriching this discussion is the disciplinary and generational diversity of the authors represented, ranging from emerging to established voices. The volume closes with an exchange between Nathaniel Coleman, Ruth Levitas, and Lyman Tower Sargent, reflecting on the contributions the essays make to situating architecture and Utopia historically and theoretically within Utopian studies, and to articulating Utopia as a method for inventing and producing better places. Intriguing to architects, planners, urban designers, and others who study and make the built environment, this collection will also be of interest to Utopian studies scholars, students, and general readers with a concern for the interrelationships between the built environment and social dreaming.
